MINUTES OF THE DRAPER CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 2019, IN THE DRAPER CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS, 1020 EAST PIONEER ROAD, DRAPER, UTAH

Study Meeting

1.0 Discussion: Recycling Policy, Robert Markle

The Council discussed the type of cardboard that was acceptable to recycle, as well as recycling policies they might initiate as a City. Mr. Markle noted that green waste was not profitable, and the landfill would no longer accept it. He explained that they would introduce the enforcement options for the recycling policy during the Business Meeting.

2.0 Council/Manager Reports

2.1 Bulk Text Amendment Timeline Updates

Russ Fox, Assistant City Manager, explained that the current public comment period for this item had been closed. However, there would be two more public hearings in November.

2.3 Mr. Fox explained that staff had reviewed the agendas and made corrections, including the removal of information that wasn't needed. He encouraged all the boards and commissions check the agendas.

2.4 Clint Smith, Fire Chief, reported that the Citizens Academy would be starting soon, and he encouraged everyone to attend. He noted that he attended the Fallen Firefighters Memorial in Colorado Springs. He thanked everyone for their support of the department.

2.5 Councilmember Green discussed the necessity of building a cemetery. Councilmember Summerhays and Lowery agreed with his remarks.

2.0 Thought/Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance

2.1 Deacon Paul Graham of the St. John the Baptist Catholic Church offered the prayer.

2.2 John Eining, Police Chief led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3.0 Recognition: Residents Peter Drubin and Sarah Gale for their efforts preventing a fire from spreading

4.0 Oath of Office: Draper Youth Council

The Oath of Office was administered by Draper City Deputy Recorder, Angela Fixmer.

5.0 Public Comments

To be considerate of everyone attending the meeting, public comments will be restricted to items not listed on this or a future agenda and limited to three minutes per person. Comments which cannot be made within these limits should be submitted in writing to the City Recorder prior to noon the day before the meeting. Comments pertaining to an item on the agenda should not be given at this time but should be held until that item is called.

5.1 Clayton Muhlestein, resident, said he was concerned with the speed limit on Fort Street. Additionally, the road was unsafe because there were no sidewalks. He suggested they lower the speed limit to 30 miles per hour and install sidewalks.

5.2 Dan Hannon, resident, said he also lived on Fort Street and was concerned about the speed limit. Children lived near the road and they could potentially get hit by cars. He also commented that the road was a mess after the City parade.

5.3 Renea Wiegand, resident thanked the City for sealing the roads in SunCrest. She also thanked Mr. Cooley and the Fire Department. She then suggested the Council hold more town hall meetings.

5.4 Addie Fuhrman, resident, was also concerned with the speed limit on Fort Street. She suggested the City consider giving this issue some attention. She thanked the Council for their work of preserving open space in Draper.

6.0 Consent Items

- a. **Approval of Resolution #19-57, reappointing LaRayne Day, Todd Shoemaker, and Katie Shell as members of the Draper City Historic Preservation Commission. (Administrative Action)**
- b. **Agreement #19-213, Federal Aid Agreement with Utah Department of Transportation. (Administrative Action)**
For the 1300 East Street Widening Project, from Wayne's World Drive to Nashi Lane. Staff: Scott Cooley

6.1 Councilmember Weeks moved to approve the consent items. Councilmember Vawdrey seconded the motion.

6.2 A roll call vote was taken with Councilmembers Green, Lowery, Summerhays, Vawdrey, and Weeks voting in favor. The motion passed unanimously.

7.0 PublicHearing: Provide Local Consent for a Limited-Service Alcohol License for the N&T Vietnamese Cuisine DBA Café Trang. (Administrative Action)

7.1 Russ Fox, Assistant City Manager, presented the staff report and explained that the applicant met all the requirements set by the State.

7.2 Mayor Walker opened the public hearing. There were none, so he closed the public hearing.

7.3 Councilmember Green moved to approve the Limited-Service Alcohol License for the N&T Vietnamese Cuisine DBA Café Trang. Councilmember Weeks seconded the motion.

7.4 A roll call vote was taken with Councilmembers Green, Lowery, Summerhays, Vawdrey, and Weeks voting in favor. The motion passed unanimously.

8.0 Action Item: Ordinance #1401, amending Title 7 Chapter 11 of the Draper City Municipal Code relating to Solid Waste and Recycling. (Legislative Action)

8.1 Robert Markle, Deputy City Engineer, explained that this ordinance would update the code regarding what types of materials could be recycled. He said they would only recycle certain types of cardboard, tin, and plastics. The ordinance also addressed code violations.

8.2 Mayor Troy Walker stated the recycling situation had changed throughout the county. Recycling costs have risen because of the global market changes. The City was now spending much more for recycling and they needed to find ways to lower the costs.

8.3 Councilmember Weeks stated there were many people passionate about recycling. She thanked Mr. Markle for his work on this item to improve recycling in the City.

8.4 Councilmember Green moved to approve Ordinance #1401. Councilmember Summerhays seconded the motion.

8.5 A roll call vote was taken with Councilmembers Green, Lowery, Summerhays, Vawdrey, and Weeks voting in favor. The motion passed unanimously.

9.0 Public Hearing: Resolution #19-54, amending the Adopted Budget for Draper City for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 (Administrative Action)

9.1 Bob Wylie presented the staff report and discussed several items on the budget, the associated costs, and revenue sources that would cover those costs.

9.2 Councilmember Lowery asked about the possibility of purchasing eBikes. She suggested they purchase two bikes to help reduce pollution and traffic. It was agreed two bikes was a good start to this program. If they were not used, the City could easily sell the equipment.

9.3 Councilmember Green said he wanted more information before they purchased the bikes. He said he did not see the benefit of the bikes.

9.4 Mayor Walker opened the public hearing.

9.5 Bob Clark, resident, said he wanted to keep government spending low. While he appreciated Councilmember Lowery's suggestion, he wanted to avoid overspending.

9.6 Clayton Muhlestein, resident, suggested the Council investigate leasing the bikes in lieu of purchasing the equipment.

9.7 Mayor Walker closed the public hearing.

9.8 Councilmember Weeks moved to approve Resolution #19-54. Councilmember Vawdrey seconded the motion.

9.8 A roll call vote was taken with Councilmembers Green, Lowery, Summerhays, Vawdrey, and Weeks voting in favor. The motion passed unanimously.

10.0 Council/Manager Reports

10.1 Councilmember Summerhays said he was in favor of lowering the speed limit on Fort Street. He agreed there were children walking down this road after school and the cars were driving too fast.

10.2 Mr. Cooley explained it was in the master plan to add sidewalks. The City was applying for federal funding to install sidewalks. This was a high priority project but was extremely expensive. Mr. Cooley said staff would conduct a speed study and come back to the Council with suggestions.

11.0 Adjournment

11.1 Councilmember Green moved to adjourn the meeting. Councilmember Lowery seconded the motion.

11.2 A roll call vote was taken with Councilmembers Green, Lowery, Summerhays, Vawdrey, and Weeks voting in favor. The motion passed unanimously.

11.3 The meeting adjourned at 7:52 p.m.
